Our collective efforts have enabled the school to reach significant milestones, and build resiliency and financial security. A few of our key accomplishments over the last five years include:

- The Step Two Capital

During the 2021-2022 school year, the Step One Board invited our community of families, alumni, faculty and staff to help us envision the next set of strategic goals for the school. The resulting 2022-2025 Strategic Plan is grounded in our school's mission to "nurture children's love of life and learning in a community rooted in respect for self and humanity." We are excited to share the pillars of the new plan with you.

### **Learning Stories:**

- Launch Learning Story professional development program to make children's learning visible to caregivers and the community.
- Deepen the professional development and mentorship for teachers within a developmentally appropriate and anti-bias framework.

Sharing and Strengthening Step One's Commitment to Inclusion

- Articulate Step One's DEIB philosophy, language, and curricular approach with children and families, as well as with the larger Early Childhood Education community.
- Implement the Sue Britson Changemaker fund -providing full financial aid to 4-5 families per year over 10 years.

### **Financial Resiliency:**

Ensuring the Future of Step One

- Undertake scenario planning to balance enrollment, class size and hours, and teacher salaries, to inform enrollment and program development.

# **Financial Update**

During the 2022-2023 school year, Step One School continued to operate within a balanced budget, even as we emerged from the challenges of the Covid-19 pandemic. We commend our teachers and administrative staff for their productivity and efficiency. They were an integral part of our high enrollment rate and cost control during the year. We would also like to thank everyone who contributed to our 2023 Annual Campaign. Budget highlights include:


- More than 75% of tuition goes directly to support teacher and administrative staff salaries and benefits
- Our Annual Fund campaign is the primary source of financial aid funding for the school (annual fundraising is 3.3% of revenues and financial aid is 3.8% of revenues)


The School continues to be in strong financial health and the Finance Committee is confident in the School's management of resources, including its reserves and capital investments. Investments the school has made over the last three years include:


- Expanded the school's reserve funds to 4 months of operating expenses
- Paid off the mortgage on the School property at the end of the mortgage term (the School is now debt-free)
- Took on new projects at the school facility, including installing upgraded HVAC systems and installing new asphalt and a shade structure in the yard


We are also proud to report that we met our fundraising goal for the Sue Briston Changemaker
Fund. Together, we raised \$800,000, which enables a new program to provide 100% financial aid for an average of 5 children each year over the next 10 years. This is in addition to our existing financial aid funds. We look forward to keeping you posted on our efforts to increase access for families who would not otherwise have the opportunity to enroll their children at Step One.

# Anti-Bias and Emergent Curriculum

At Step One, our curriculum is designed using a play based emergent curriculum philosophy. Emergent curriculum is a collaborative process, initiated by children's strengths and interests. Teachers listen to conversations among children and observe their play to inform curriculum. This child-led approach is balanced with the adult's own specific goals in mind, such as meeting developmental benchmarks and learning foundations. Our teachers also use an anti-bias framework to: nurture the identity of each child, promote empathetic interaction between friends from diverse backgrounds, foster children's capacity to identify bias, and to cultivate the ability to stand up for one's self and others.

Last year, teachers in several classrooms decided to go deep into an area of interest and curiosity that is common for children at this age: the desire to create, make art, and use multiple mediums to express themselves. Teachers watched as children connected to various photographs and books of artwork, many of which featured Black artists, both historical and current. One preschool classroom immersed themselves in the work of Kehinde Wiley. Kehinde Wiley's works are deeply rooted in the Black experience and draw from the history of classical portraiture. In 2017, Wiley was chosen to paint the official portrait of former President Barack Obama. The children were fascinated by the bold colors and florals in Kehinde Wiley's

pieces, as well as the striking poses of the people in each painting. Each child went through multiple stages of creating their own Kehinde Wileyinspired self-portraits.

First, the children looked through many examples of Wiley's work and spent time deciding which one spoke to and inspired them: the colors, the shapes, and the poses of the models. Then, the children were asked to pose just like the people in the portraits. Finally, the children went through the process of cutting themselves out and gluing themselves onto the original, colorful backgrounds.

### **Teacher Amalie describes the process in this way:**



I wanted the students to have the experience of taking on the personality of the portraits, which is why I had them pick an image that spoke to them and pose in that way. They became a part of the art, which made the experience more powerful.





The children not only had a chance to practice their fine motor and artmaking skills, but they were also moved to think critically about art and their own identity and to admire the beauty and creativity of their friends. The children became incredible works of art themselves and their portraits were displayed on the windows of Room 2 for the community to admire.

# **Alumni Highlight**

Gianna Gunier attended Step One from 2003-2006. When Gianna was a senior at Berkeley High School, she took a Law and Social Justice class that sparked her interest in and passion for learning about the justice system, specifically how the justice system interacts with social and public health. After graduating from Berkeley High, Gianna attended UCLA, where she discovered the Carceral Ecologies Lab, a lab devoted to projects that research the injustices of the prison industrial complex as they intersect with environmental injustices. Gianna says that this lab was the "best thing I experienced at UCLA."

Gianna's time working with the lab grew her passion for advocating for real change and disrupting and dismantling unjust systems. Gianna worked on multiple projects with the lab, including the Autopsy Analysis project, which explored the role that medical examiners at LA County Jail play in perpetuating police violence. Gianna graduated from UCLA this spring and is excited to begin to explore work in the world that will allow her to continue to learn, grow, and contribute to positive change. Whatever she decides to do next, we know that Gianna will embody the Step One values of listening to her heart and helping others!


